It was a very successful visit and Mr Collins was interested to meet staff and pupils as well as listen to issues that affect our school. MP Margaret Greenwood Visit:

We have also had a visit from Margaret Greenwood, who is the Member of Parliament for our local area. Again, due to the general election we were unable to write about her visit earlier as this would have also contravened local and national government regulations. Margaret attended with Ellie, her aide, and this visit was also successful. Margaret was very pleased to meet all staff and pupils and thought our school was lovely. She was particularly interested in our approach to positive mental health and how we cater for the needs of the whole child, effectively balancing pastoral with academic. She was also fascinated by our creative approach and very pleased to find out about our class assemblies and how we promote reading in school. The School Council were able to interview her to ascertain her views on issues that affect us all. I have listed their questions below...the School Council's questions really made her think and wouldn't have been out of place on Question Time! Thank you Miss Hine for preparing the children in advance in your role as School Council Lead...

School Council Interview With Margaret Greenwood, MP 22.11.19.

Violet – How did you become a Member of Parliament?

MG - I was campaigning for more money to fund the NHS because I think they do a really good job and need more money. I became so passionate about it that I decided to apply to become a member of the Labour Party. I won the vote and I was selected and, at the moment, I am campaigning for the General Election.

Benji - How often do you visit Parliament?

MG - I visit Parliament every week except in the summer, at Christmas and at Easter. I travel down on a Sunday evening and I am in Parliament from the Monday through to the Thursday. I meet people in Wirral on the Fridays and Saturdays and talk to them lots about the area they live and their concerns.

Lottie - Why did you want to become an MP?

MG - I wanted to help and protect the NHS.

Will – How would your party raise money for our school?

MG – We raise money through taxes on working people. Those taxes pay for the Police, schools, the NHS for example.

Aimee - What can we do in our school to help to stop global warming?

MG - What an important question, you can do lots! We need to remember to switch lights off in rooms that we are not using. We need to walk to school and work when we can, rather than driving. We can also spread the work and help other people to realise that little changes can make a big difference.

Amelia – Is Jeremy Corbyn nice to work for?

MG - He's a really nice man, very kind. He's quietly humorous and always remembers to say thank you.

Kai – How do you think we can help with climate change?

MG – We can try not to drive as much where possible. We can protect the trees that we do have – they help our environment so much and we can also plant new trees. We can cut down on single use plastics as they are clogging up our oceans. We need to protect our wildlife and their habitats and our beaches need to stay clean!

Stephanie – How important is an MP's job?

MG - An MP's job is a very big honour. You have to listen to your constituents and, as laws are being decided in government it is our job to feed the constituents' ideas through to the government. You pass the ideas of the people you represent which is a very important job I think.

Isla – How would you reduce the use of single use plastic throughout all schools in the country?

MG – Well we can issue a law on it but we would need to find alternatives for people to use. We would encourage the 'Reuse, Reduce, Recycle' message. Perhaps we could set up competitions and challenges for pupils.

Daniel – How serious is global warming getting?

MG - It's really serious, we all have to help. We can all make a difference. When we all try we will see a really big change.

Jess – How can you ensure that our school has enough money to provide every pupil with a really good education?

MG - We could put more money into schools. We could train more teachers. We could get rid of SATs because they are used to measure schools and we are more interested in the pupils. We would put more money in for music, dance, drama and art subjects too. An education is so important, it's your foundation for life, especially when you are younger.

Ben – What can be done to ensure we have enough doctors, nurses and policemen to keep us healthy and safe?

MG - We would reintroduce the trainee nurse bursary – that's when we pay nurses to train on the job. We would train 5000 doctors a year, which is an increase of 1500 and we would have a recruitment drive with the Police to get more Police employed.

As you can read, our School Council asked very mature questions and ensured they covered all aspects of a child living in Thingwall and growing up in modern day Britain. Well done children we are really proud of the way you conducted yourselves.

Thingwall Elections:

Whilst the rest of the country got involved in the debates of the General Election, we decided to make full use of the polling Station voting booths and hold our own mini general elections! Each class held a mini debate and a resulting vote to decide on a classroom choice. It was a really worthwhile day and a great learning curve for our children, building on the sessions we held last year when we were allowed to borrow the Parliamentary Box for our KS2 pupils.

The children learned that...

- It is right and fair for everyone to have an opportunity to vote
- We know that we must use our vote and take it seriously
- We know that we should always cast our vote, even if we think our vote won't win
- We have to go with the majority vote, no matter what our feelings are

...great lessons for the future I am sure you'll agree!

Although I was unable to attend the infant performances due to my poorly foot (I hadn't quite mastered crutches at that point!)
